

Crime and Punishment Glossary

<p>Capital Punishment – the death penalty</p> <p>Community service order – punishment; criminal has to do a set number of hours' work in the community</p> <p>Corporal punishment – physically hurting the criminal as punishment</p> <p>Conscience – sense of right and wrong; feeling guilty</p> <p>Crime – breaking the law; can be against person, property or the state</p> <p>Deterrence – aim of punishment to put others off doing it</p> <p>Duty – something we are bound to do</p> <p>Evil – something (someone) considered morally wrong; wicked.</p> <p>Forgiveness – letting go of anger towards someone for a wrong they have done</p> <p>Hate crime – a crime committed because of prejudice eg beating someone up for being gay. In UK, it can mean doubling a sentence if found guilty</p>	<p>Imprisonment – locking someone up as a punishment</p> <p>Justice – making things fair again</p> <p>Law – the rules which govern a country to keep it safe</p> <p>Order – the enforcement of rules eg by police force</p> <p>Parole – release of a criminal from prison, but continue to monitor their behaviour</p> <p>Probation order – punishment; monitoring of behaviour with the threat of greater punishment if found offending again</p> <p>Protection – aim of punishment to keep people safe</p> <p>Reformation – aim of punishment to help a person see how they can behave better</p> <p>Reparation – aim of punishment to make up for or compensate victim</p> <p>Retribution – aim of punishment to get someone back for what they have done</p> <p>Victim – the one against whom a crime is committed</p> <p>Young offenders – person under 18 who commits a crime</p>
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
